The April session of the Death Café was really interesting. Each event has been quite different from the others. This one was more of a discussion of practical matters. I am finding that the tagline used is very descriptive: "Coffee, Teac, Cake, & Death. Join the Conversation." I am looking forward to the next session, which will be held on May 4th at 7 -9 pm at Beth El Congregation in Harrisonburg. A really high point during April was the three-session Redux of the Elementary Biblical Hebrew "grammar" on the Akedah (Binding of Isaac) – it was fabulous! Those signed up came together and had a fun time learning, and fantastic discussions about the different meanings that one could find in the text simply by looking closely at the actual words and sentences. Even better – we will begin the eight session course on Noah May 1st. Look at Things of Note for details. I urge you to think about putting that on your calendar – I'm sure you will enjoy it.

A lot of planning, preparation, and work have gone into the community Passover Seder. The Seder will take place after this article is submitted, but I am sure that those who attend will

From the Rabbi's Desk	enjoy a lovely meal, and an opportunity to come together and celebrate in the manner that has been 'traditional' in the congregation for many years. This is just a shout out to all those who have been involved. Thanks for the work that you put in to make this happen.
Torah and Calendar	The Torah Parashiot for the coming weeks are Pesach Day 1, Pesach Day 8, Acharei Mot, Kedoshim, Emor and Behar. We are in year 3 of the triennial cycle (the third of the three divisions of the cycle of Torah readings.) Rosh Chodesh for Iyar is May 8 th and 9 th . The Sefirat HaOmer (Counting of the Omer) begins April 23 in the evening (the second day of Passover) and goes through until Erev Shavuot, this year June 11 th at sundown, marking the time between Redemption and Revelation, from Yetziat Mitzrayim (going out from Egypt) to the encounter with the Divine at Sinai. Also during this month, Yom HaSho'ah (Holocaust Remembrance Day) is May 5 th , Yom HaZikaron (Day of Remembrance, Israel's Memorial Day) is May 11 th , and Yom HaAtzma'ut (Israel Independence Day) is May 12 th . On the secular calendar, Mother's Day is May 8 th and Memorial Day is May 30 th .
Rabbi's Message	I hope that your Passover is/was a sweet and meaningful time and that you were able to deal with your figurative 'chametz'. May the period of the counting of the Omer be for you, as for the Hebrews, a time of preparation and rising from redemption to revelation. I have said before that memory is integral for us as Jews, and this month there are multiple events that commemorate both the happy and the sad, both communal and personal. The calendar this month is a remeinder to stop and take note.
	Communally we have Memorial Day and Yom HaZikaron, of course, but also Yom HaSho'ah and Yom HaAtzma'ut as reminders and signals. On the personal level, it is customary on the last day of Passover (and also on Yom Kippur, the last days of Shavuot and Sukkot, as well as during the period between Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur, in addition to the Yahrzeit) to remember our loved ones who remain with us only in memory.
	Spanning the communal and personal, we see that the religious school year is coming to an end, with the secular school year not far behind. Some of the young people involved will be reaching the end of their time as students in the religious school. High school graduation is near at hand and the annual SHORTY Confirmation service is to take place on May 21 st , signaling that we will soon be wishing well and farewell to those students going off into the wider world.
	I am always happy for the students and proud of the people they have become, knowing that their presence will make their communities and the world a better place. I hope you will join me as we celebrate their accomplishments and ritually mark this moment of transition. In the words we use as we finish reading each of the books of the Torah, <i>chazak, chazak, venitchazake</i> . May they (and we) go from strength to strength and be strengthened.

Things of note	 On the immediate horizon we have a Pulpit Exchange scheduled for the April 29th service. Rev. Shelby Owen will be delivering the Devar Torah that night and I will be preaching at Emmanuel Episcopal on Sunday morning, May 1st. I will be looking at Psalm 67 (which is part of the lectionary used for that day) as my text. High holidays will be here before you know it and one of the central parts of the service is the blowing of the shofar. As we have for the past several years, WE NEED A SHOFAR BLOWER. A new shofar blower would benefit from several months to practice and rehearse and learn to play the instrument and learn the calls. Please contact Rosalie Waterman.

More things of note	 The Elementary Biblical Hebrew course will start on May 1st. We have scheduled this course for eight sessions over three months. Each session is scheduled to take place at 4-5:30 pm on Sunday afternoons at Temple House of Israel. The dates are May 1, 8, 15, June 19, 26, July 10, 17 and 24. In this course we will study the text of Noah and the Flood and we will also add selected Midrashim that expand on and try to explain the 'meaning' of the story. It is truly fascinating stuff and a lot of fun to read. Come with an open mind and prepare to be surprised. © There is no cost and the texts are provided, but you will probably want to have a Tanakh (Hebrew bible) or a Chumash (commentary) available for reference. Please let Rabbi Joe know you are interested so the distribution of materials by email before the first class can occur. It helps if you know the Hebrew alphabet, but you don't need anything more than that (and opinions on the texts!) to participate. The first of a two-part article on Major Alexander Hart and his family has just been published in the prestigious New England Historical and Genealogical Register (Volume 170, pages 8-12). The article, written by Cherry Fletcher Bamberg, traces the family back to Major Hart's great-grandfather who emigrated from Germany to England; Major Hart's grandfather then came to America. The second part of the article, to be published in the next issue, will detail the life, career and descendants of Major Hart. The NEHG Register is considered to be one of the most prestigious genealogical journals in the country. Ms. Bamberg, a Fellow of the American Society of Genealogists, has graciously donated a copy of the Register to our Temple library.
