## From the Rabbi

So I'm in my Mini Cooper about a quarter mile from our home. A woman failed to heed a Yield sign. I was hit on the passenger side, flew (literally) onto someone's property knocking over a fence and hitting two parked cars. I was able to get out and the only injury I suffered was/is a "skiers" thumb, a little cut on my knee and that's it. I was lucky.

There's a prayer one says following moments like this; it's called *bentching gomel* (the Yiddish word *bentching* is derived from the same origin as "benediction.") One offers this prayer when a life was spared. I've assisted others in reciting it. This was the first time I ever had to offer it myself.

I "Googled" it (of course I did; I "Google" everything) and I found the following: "bentching gomel" is a recognition that all those little gifts from God that are all too easy to take for granted are not less thanks-worthy than (a) major event such as the lesson of the Exodus—that God is constantly bestowing His (sic!) goodness to me.

What this rabbi is saying is that our sages looked at our history which has proven the need to thank God for what we might consider huge moments of being saved, moments when our entire People might have disappeared were it not for the goodness of God. Those like the Exodus remind us that we are here today because of a life-saving moment in our People's history.

But we know that our tradition teaches that each man, woman and child is as important as our People in the aggregate; each individual is created in the Divine Image.

I'm grateful that I can begin the secular new year able to write this and to continue to serve you. I'm grateful that I can still be with my family and friends. I'm grateful that God sought to it to preserve me at least for a little while longer.

May each of you and yours have a HEALTHY and PEACEFUL 2019... and don't wait til November to give thanks for, as the television show states "a million little things."

Gift to the Congregation	Thanks to an artistic metal sculptor, we now have a steel menorah on permanent dis- play in the social hall. Keith Zimmerman completed his year-long certification pro- gram run by the Virginia Institute of Blacksmithing, and presented the menorah as a gift to the congregation during the December 7th service. Keith lives in Staunton and works at his forge in Waynesboro. His sculpture is exhibited at the Michael Tusing Gallery (next door) and the Shenandoah Valley Art Center. Thank you Keith!					
Cemetery Landscaping	There are visible changes to our cemetery! A comprehensive master plan for the entire cemetery site was funded by Dennis Ward and Rabbi Lynne Landsberg with the professional guidance of Amy Arnold, city planner and landscape architect. Amy researched our cemetery, created a photographic booklet and drew plans for development in phases to include landscape trees, shrubs and seating. The goal was to create a contemplative space with both visual and auditory separation from Augusta Street and the neighboring residences. The specific plant material was selected for low maintenance once the plants are established. Phase I includes the planting of a continuous hedge along the north and east edges of the historic section of the cemetery which will grow to 6-7' in height with no pruning. Those plants will go in the fall, 2019. Phase II continues the separation along North August Street with a mixture of flowering shrubs and is now complete. Phase III recommends adding trees and small gardens with benches. Phase IV, V and VI continue the plan which is available for anyone to view in the Rabbi's office. Each aspect of the plan will be coordinated with the Temple Trustees.					
	Dennis and Lynne have also very generously donated the plants, the labor by Staunton Plant Company and the maintenance for phases I and II in order to get the plants es- tablished. The congregation, past, present and future, are extremely grateful for this long range gift to us all. Thank you, Dennis, with Lynne's blessings.
