A Word ... or More "The Strange Connection Between Purim and the Day of Atonement"

The "official" name of our Day of Atonement is Yom Hakippurim. Hebrew being the fascinating language it is, we can take that name and translate it "A day that is like Purim." Why? Grammatically, because the letter/sound "k" means "like" or "as."

Religiously, because just as on Purim, many Jews masquerade as pious Jews on Yom Kippur. As some ministers and priests say about their flock on their special days, "They're 'revolving' Christians, in on Christmas and out on Easter". For our people such is often the case with Rosh Hashonah and Yom Kippur.

Of course there are those who are "regulars" in the synagogues. They are present every Shabbat, sometimes during the week as well. But is this real or a masquerade? Fortunately most have an authentic sense of the Eternal in their lives, but in some cases Jewish identity is only within the four walls of the synagogue; we're not so pious in our personal and professional lives.

There are those who wear the mask of "Captain Justice: Guardian of the Poor and Oppressed, the Orphan and the Widow." They pay verbal homage to the causes of social justice yet do better with the *idea* of justice than the hard work of justice. I know such a leader who loved humanity but didn't particularly love humans.

Purim is the time when we're permitted—even encouraged—to wear masks: on Yom Kippur we are asked to leave those masks behind and seriously look at ourselves for what we are, what we've done and how we plan to change. It always amazes me how relevant Judaism is despite the centuries we've been around.
