From the Rabbi

As I think about the months I served Temple House of Israel I'm struck by how quickly the time has flown by. Well, as they say—whoever "they" are—"Time flies when you're having fun!" And except for the very long drive it is to get here from Wilmington, Delaware, it has been fun. My drive in this coming year will be a smidgeon shorter as I'll be serving the Harrisonburg congregation.

The word "fun" in the dictionary has various definitions, one of which is "enjoyment." That's my operative definition in this context.

It's been fun meeting such wonderful congregants and those who have just dropped by for various reasons. There is a definite feeling that despite issues of the past there WILL BE a Jewish future in this part of the Shenandoah Valley, and Temple House of Israel will be the center.

It's been fun experiencing worship in so beautiful a sanctuary as you have. As I might have mentioned (and at this stage of my life I might have mentioned a great deal, only I've forgotten that I mentioned them), I was struck by your magnificent Holy Ark. It's not in 2018 that I was taken by it; it was in 1970 when I was given a tour of the THO!! Since then I've said to countless people. "The most beautiful Holy Ark I've ever seen is in the synagogue in Staunton, Virginia!" That and the aura of true holiness (kedusha in Hebrew) I've felt at worship has made officiating at Shabbat services something I've looked forward to before each visit. Highlighting that kedusha is the incomparable melody to which you chant the first three parts of the Amidah: Avot v'imahot: Gevurot and Kedushat HaShem. Even more exciting to me.. EVERYBODY SINGS ALONG! You are a singing congregation, something I worked for many, many years to achieve in Wilmington.

I'm glad that you have begun occasional worship, conducted by laypeople. Thankfully our tradition doesn't require a rabbi for that. The requirement is that you must be over Bar/Bat Mitzvah age (it's also good to have a general sense that you know what you're doing). Those of THOI who have conducted worship—aside from meeting that age requirement—know what they're doing... they just need **more** *Jews in the Pews* to feel that it's a worthwhile endeavor.

You cannot give up on regular **weekly** services regardless who is conducting them. People come into a community, either for a visit or to consider relocating, and when they know they can count on a worship service being held each Friday or Saturday or both (yes, even if they don't attend!), they feel the permanence of Judaism in that town; if not, they might not consider that community in which to settle.

I've had fun writing weekly and monthly articles. It has given us the opportunity to "meet" each other even if we haven't done so in person. You now might know a bit more about me, what I believe, how I view my years in the rabbinate, and how I envision the Jewish faith and folk of tomorrow. I appreciate the feedback I've

received from those articles; I hope you've learned something of value.

I've had fun meeting some of the wonderful Christian clergy in Staunton and its environs. In this case the typical definition of "fun" might be applied. We've had a good time and had numerous laughs over this and that. But there is more: over almost five decades in the rabbinate, I haven't always felt comfortable in interfaith situations. In Staunton, with the show of support we've received after two horrific synagogue tragedies, I can say that a longer tenure in THOI might have results in solid friendships being established both professionally and personally.

I am confident that Rabbi Nagel will have a fruitful rabbinate in Temple House of Israel and have fun in the process. I hope you're as kind to her as you have been to me in my short time here. I sincerely hope that she guides you to even greater congregational health so you might grow in number and in spirit. I have all the confidence that you've got it within you—individually and communally—to be a force to be reckoned with, a Jewish force, a spiritual force.

May the force be with you... and may God bless you with the richest blessings that can be offered.

High Holidays Planning

Before we know it, the High Holidays at THOI will be upon us. Honors are a part of the congregational experience during this time. Honors can include opening the ark, doing a reading in English, being called up to the Torah, or carrying the Torah scroll. Performing an honor can enrich the spiritual experience of the Days of Awe for many people. Every year the Rabbi gives a list of honors to the Ritual Committee, who is turn offer these to members and other attendees. This list is returned to the Rabbi with names assigned to each one. The Ritual Committee will begin the Honors process early by gathering information from each member with respect to likely attendance for each service, your interest in an honor and whether you anticipate having guests who might like an honor. The goal is to communicate to the Rabbi at least one month prior to Erev Rosh Hashanah as to the number and type of honors that best suits our community, and to make progress in assignments in advance of the High Holiday period.
